




# SOWATORINI LANDSCHAFT




## FEELING Courtyard of Deutsches Hygiene-Museum Dresden

A radical greening: In the lower area we will plant a dense thicket. Long, red horizontal sculptures lead the visitors through the shrubs and trees. They offer the possibility to sit or lie down in the dense, shady atmosphere in contrast to the sun-exposed higher level in front of the foyer.

## TRANSFORMATION IN THREE ACTS Domshof, innercity square in Bremen

Act 1: Shape The north-east corner of the square is raised. The result is a landscape sculpture that works with the existing slope of the square. The ramp to the bicycle parking in the bunker beneath the square will be integrated into this sculpture.

Act 2: Extend The existing group of trees will be extended to form a grove on the eastern side of the square. Act 3: Densify The market space becomes denser. We all know that: A good market is narrow.

We think: A courageous design about the fact that multicoding is more than just free space for events, about new mobility, climate change, material recycling and: the power of artificial landscapes. Or to use the words of the jury: Hello future!





## GOLD-ZACK FACTORY Surroundings of a historic factory site in Wuppertal

Three sub-spaces create new connections around the historic building, new places for urban nature and the people of the neighbourhood. The main role is played by the transformation of existing structures and surfaces and a courageous use of plants. Vegetation in gaps and cracks in the hollyhock path and the existing Japanese knotweed thicket as a starting point of the new "Bergisch rainforest".






## DISCOVER Fountain in the Stadtgarten Stuttgart






## DANCEFLOOR Railway wasteland in Bolzano

## TREES AT THE HORIZON Riverside promenade and dam crest in Rurberg, Eifel

RUR

The dams at lake Rursee draw a horizon into a landscape that knows no horizon. These lines divide the formerly deep valley into a forest world and a water world. Above this dividing horizon, the design is working with trees. The theme of the forest of the national park is transformed at the banks of Rurberg into a succession of different atmospheres essentially shaped by trees. The characteristic of the dam in its horizontality and linearity is elaborated by a distinctive dam crest and is therefore the only place without trees. A shining landmark visible from a distance as a fine accent in the valley.




## COLORI DI VILLA MASSIMO Studio 6

The colours of Villa Massimo will be on canvas as part of the Festa dell'Arte at Villa Massimo. Visitors will be able to work together on a 10 meter long canvas to illustrate the villa's colour landscape. Whether iris, cedar needles, grasses, saffron, lime, laurel or dirt. All the colours from the villa's park are collected, boiled or crushed and pressed.
